It appeared that Mr Booth had gone out into a paddock to bring in a cow. He did not return, and half an hour later was found lying dead.

A verdict of "Death from Natural Causes" was recorded.

MILITARY PLAQUES FOR RELATIVES.

His Excellency the Governor-General has received a telogram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies which states, inter alia:-

His Majesty's Government offer prizes amounting in all to not less than £500 (in proportion to be subsequently decided) for a limited number of the most sucessful models for a small memorial plaque in bronze to be given next-of-kin of those members of His Majesty's Naval and Military Forces who have fallen at the front. The names of competitors will not be revealed to the judges, and the name of the nominated artist or artists alone will be published. All competitors must be British-born subjects. Prints of information to competitors will follow by post, and will be published when they arrive."

MEN WHO HAVE GIVEN ALL.
